 - Teachers can use this time to read aloud to students/have a guest reader for the period. If students prefer to read their own books independently, they may read on their own).



- Use your discretion when allowing students to "get comfortable". At certain ages that might mean napping.

Dr. Seuss Virtual Library on Mrs. Stark's Music Google Classrooms

- There is a link to a virtual library with Dr. Seuss books in Mrs. Stark's K-5 google classroom. If a student is unable to check out a Dr. Seuss book from our physical library, they can have the book read to them!
- Students will still need to take a test on the book to get their card punched for that title. They may want to listen to it at least two times prior to taking a test.
- BEFORE students start using this library, I am in the process now of making sure links work the way they are supposed to.

<u>Clothing and Days:</u> March 1-3 and 8-10 we will have the following dress up days.

- Monday, March 1: Sneech Day! Wear Yellow

- March 2 is also the national holiday: Read Across America

Dear Parents/ Guardians:

The Niobrara Kindergarten Round-up has been scheduled for Friday, March 19th, 2021. It will be held in the Kindergarten Room in the elementary building from 8:10-2:00. We will be filling out forms and paperwork and answering any questions you have. You will have the opportunity to meet many of the staff members who will be working with your child next year. The school nurse, audiologist and speech clinician will be on hand doing individualized testing.

School Law section 79-214 states that children are eligible to attend kindergarten if they turn 5 on or before July 31 of the calendar year in which the school year for which the child is seeking admission begins.

State Law requires that students have a physical administered by a licensed physician and an eye exam before a child enters Kindergarten. All immunizations do not need to be done before round-up on the 19th. A copy of an official birth certificate must also be kept on file at the school. You may wish to bring that on the 19th so we can make a copy.

As a general reminder, if you are a resident of another district, option enrollment papers must be completed and turned in to Niobrara Public Schools by **March 15th**, **2021**.

Your child will be working and playing with their future classmates and will become accustomed to the school setting on the day of round-up. The students are invited to eat in the school cafeteria as our guest. Both breakfast and lunch will be served. Breakfast runs from 7:45 thru 8:10. Lunch is served at 11:20 a.m.

Niobrara Public Schools welcome you and your child to Kindergarten Round-up 2021. We hope you find it informative and helpful. We look forward to meeting you and your child.



Science

We just finished up learning about plant structures and how they help them survive. To better understand how flowers reproduce, we dissected a flower to identify the stamen, pistil, anther, and ovary. We had a blast carefully dissecting our flowers to see all these unique parts! We are currently learning about animal structures and how they help them survive, grow, and reproduce!

Reading

In reading, we finished up reading two myths based on Greek Mythology - 'The Golden Touch' and 'The Miraculous Pitcher'. Both of these stories teach us valuable lessons in life, which is the theme of a story - Be careful what you wish for and be kind to others. We are currently reading the folktale - Beauty and the Beast. It's quite different than the movie versions, so it's been fun to compare and contrast the two!

Writing

reading, the students took notes on the main Greek Gods and Goddesses in Goddesses and then wrote an opinion writing piece on their brite one! These Gods are quite interesting and definitely stained us by reading about each of them! Ask a 4th grader which God/Goddess is his/her favorite!

SPRING FORWARD

Spring is approaching and learning is in full swing here at Niobrara Public School. As you may know, this is a time of year that students make the most academic and social learning improvements. Make school a priority. Very soon the weather will change with spring right around the corner. It can be challenging to keep our children focused on learning.

The time shift has a major impact on human routines, which influence sleep-wake cycles, body temperature, hormone release, digestion, eating habits, and other important bodily functions. Don't be surprised if you notice a temporary state of mix-up in sleep, hunger, and metabolism. Keep an eye out for these shifts and know that they will subside in a few weeks.

It takes time to adjust to the new routine and to going to sleep a little earlier. This is especially important for students that need routine and consistency. Lack of sleep can lead to troubled mood, motor skill reduction, and memory, performance, and concentration level changes. This can be very stimulating for students with demands from both home and school. What can you do to make school a top priority for your child? Keep these ideas in mind:

- Make attendance your number one priority. Let your child know that unless they
 are sick, they must attend school (and be on time.) Try to schedule
 appointments after school hours.
- Show you care. Talk about school activities and projects. Try to attend as many school events as you can.
- Remain positive. Try to set a positive example for your child, even when your own day has been challenging. If you show a positive attitude about your work, your child may feel better about their own.

Also, students in grades 3-8 will be venturing into the first state assessment cycle with NSCAS testing during March 30-April 1. Juniors will be taking their ACT test on March 23. During the week that your child is testing, make certain that your son/daughter rests properly each night, arrives for school on time, and is not distracted at home.

Finally, know that you do not have to wait for parent conferences to call if you have questions, concerns, or needs. We are here to serve your children and your families. Please contact your child's teacher, the office staff, or administration if you want to set up a meeting to discuss any issues that arise. As always, THANK YOU for being our partners in this important work helping your child enjoy learning and prepare for a bright future!



Star Quilt Design Challenge



The star quilt was adopted by many tribes during the reservation era, when tribes were displaced from their traditional homelands onto Indian reservations and witnessed the near extermination of the buffalo. The giving of buffalo hides and robes is a tradition among many tribes as an act of love, peace and respect. Giving a star quilt is one of the greatest honors among the Lakota, Dakota and other Northern Plains tribes that have traditionally hunted buffalo.

The pattern of the star quilt is inspired by the Morning Star. The Morning Star is the last and brightest star in the eastern horizon before dawn. It was believed the Morning Star represented the way the spirits came to earth and served as a link between the living and those who have passed.


Academic Learning

Virtual College Fair is March 2-3

Attend the EducationQuest Virtual College Fair March 2-3 to visit with representatives from nearly 75 colleges and to hear from college-prep experts. Register at eqf.org/collegefair.

College reps will be available during these times, but you can visit college booths any time: Tuesday, March 2 from 9:00 - noon CT and Wednesday, March 3 from 5:00 - 8:00 p.m. CT

Live presentations March 2 at 9:30 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. will cover critical college-prep tasks for seniors and juniors. A presentation March 3 at 6:00 p.m. will provide answers to common questions about the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid).

Wrapping up your senior year

Complete the financial aid process. By now, you should have completed your FAFSA. If you haven't, do so at studentaid.gov. If your college requests verification of your FAFSA information, submit required documents so that the school can award your financial aid.

Watch your student portal and email closely. Once you're accepted for admission, the colleges you listed on your FAFSA will notify you of the financial aid they're offering.

Keep your grades up. If you get poor grades this semester, your college could revoke your admission.

Apply for scholarships. See <u>ScholarshipQuest</u> at **EducationQuest.org** for Nebraska-based scholarships. You'll also find links to national scholarship sites.

Make your final college selection. Notify the other colleges so they can take you off their mailing list.

Be aware of deadlines to accept financial aid and college admission offers, submit your housing deposit, and register for new-student orientation.

Juniors...it's time to narrow your college choices.

Narrow your college choices soon to prepare for these upcoming activities:

ACT Test. When you take the ACT this spring, you'll be asked to provide a list of colleges that should receive your score.

Completion of the <u>FAFSA</u> early next fall. You and your parents can complete the FAFSA beginning October 1 of your senior year. The colleges you list on the form will receive the results.

College applications. Early next fall, it will be time to apply to your top college choices.

Campus visits will help you narrow your choices
