
High School Math News








MTSS UPDATE





Literacy information for you!

Reasons to Read Aloud to Your Kids

- **Promotes bonding:** Reading aloud with children provides benefits for adults too. The quality time spent together promotes bonding and strengthens relationships, making it easier for children to develop their social, communication, and interpersonal skills.
- Increases attention span: Unlike watching television, reading, or being read to promotes a slower unfolding of events and ideas. This encourages children to listen, pay attention, and concentrate, which after a while can increase their overall attention span.

AWESOME READERS from September!

In 28 days, students and staff have checked out a total of 807 books from the school library! Students have checked out 743 of those books while staff added 64. Top elementary book checkout was a tie between Zane Brandt and Olivia McClellan with 27 books. Top middle school book checkout goes to DuWayne Traversie while Austinia Latorra has the top number for high school with 7. Top teacher book checkout goes to Mrs. Pavelka in pre-school with 31.

Hello Niobrara Patrons! I have a question for you. What is self-efficacy?

Self-efficacy is the belief we have in our abilities and competencies. Our self-efficacy determines how we think and feel about ourselves and influences our thoughts, emotions, actions, behaviors, and motivation.

You might be wondering why I am talking about self-efficacy, and the reason is because it is so important to develop that mind-set in our youth. Self-efficacy impacts grades, work ethic, behavior, relationships with peers, and decision making. If our students don't believe in themselves, it does not matter how much WE believe in them because they will continually have that negative self-talk. So how can we improve our youth's self-efficacy? The first step is to identify if we have low self-efficacy.

People with low self-efficacy commonly share the following features:

- They avoid accepting challenges as they fear failure.
- They firmly believe that they are not capable of performing complicated tasks.
- They focus on failures and adversities as **personal** shortcomings.
- They are less confident about themselves.
- They lack a sense of commitment to their work.
- They have a hard time recovering from setbacks and underachievements.
- They quickly lose interest in activities and work they were a part of.
- They expect results without putting in the effort.
- They are highly susceptible to depression and anxiety about facing failures.
- They focus more on their weaknesses and less on their strengths.

Now it's time to learn how we can improve self-efficacy in our youth.

- 1. **Stay in the Stretch Zone:** There are three zones in which we lie in; the comfort zone, the stretch zone, and the panic zone. If we keep ourselves in the stretch zone by setting individual and professional goals, we keep challenging ourselves in a healthy manner.
- 2. **Set Simple Goals:** This is a good way to build and sustain self-efficacy. By achieving goals one at a time our confidence will build. If we don't achieve a goal, revisit the goal and set a new one...just keep moving forward.
- 3. **Look at the Big Picture**: One might have a big goal they want to achieve and along the way, a subgoal was not accomplished. We need to teach our youth that setbacks are okay, but we have to power through them and keep the "Big Picture" in mind.
- 4. **Reframe Obstacles**: Reconstruct the way you look at failure. At some point we are all going to fail! Helping our youth look at failure as an opportunity will build resilience to failure and teach them to overcome obstacles.

As I become older and wiser in my years, I have learned that self-efficacy is the most important factor to achievement and success. Learning self-efficacy at a young age will set our youth up for a lifetime of overcoming obstacles and meeting goals that impact their future!

Please keep our students safe!

Creating a safe learning environment is the number one goal at Niobrara Public Schools. We need your help! Each day there are 10-15 students from town that cross the Highway 12/Spruce Ave. intersection at the Trading Post/J&K corner. The main portion of the traffic in this intersection occurs between 7:20 and 7:50 prior to the start of school. If you have noticed there has been a strong Sheriff's Office presence and stops are being conducted for anyone not yielding to the pedestrians on that corner. This is not just a reminder for drivers but students alike. Please take time to visit with your child or neighbor about the importance of following safety protocols while crossing any street regardless of the travel use. Let's all work together to ensure that safety is our number one goal.

Message to students: Stop at the curb at a corner or crosswalk.

- Look left, right, and left again, making sure no vehicles are approaching. Make eye contact with any nearby drivers before crossing. Make sure cars have come to a complete stop before crossing.
- When you cross the street what are the things you should do before during and after crossing the street?

Message to the Community: 9 Driving Safety Tips

Look out for pedestrians everywhere, always. Safety is a shared responsibility.


- 1. Use extra caution when driving in hard-to-see conditions, such as nighttime or bad weather.
- 2. Slow down and be prepared to stop when turning or otherwise entering a crosswalk.
- 3. Yield to pedestrians in crosswalks and stop well back from the crosswalk to give other vehicles an opportunity to see the crossing pedestrians so they can stop too.
- 4. Never pass vehicles stopped at a crosswalk. There may be people crossing that you can't see.
- 5. Never drive under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs.
- 6. Follow the speed limit, especially around people on the street.
- 7. Follow slower speed limits in school zones and in neighborhoods where children are present.
- 8. Be extra cautious when backing up—pedestrians can move into your path.



Talking with kids can be difficult to do.

This month I have added some resources to help you talk to your kids about difficult topics like bullying, substance abuse, and college or career planning. Remember, "parents and families are critical partners in helping their children develop social and emotional know-how" (CASEL, 2021).
